ORIGIN & SOURCE

Čoček is originally an improvisational solo dance done by gypsies in various Balkan countries. It is performed individually or opposite each other and the most characteristic styling features are subtle syncopated lifts and shimmies in the hips and shoulders.

The version described below is a line-cocek that became quite popular in more recent times among the gypsies in Macedonia.

Other names are Cupurlike, Skopsko Cigansko and Ramo, a gypsy song with which the dance is often associated.

**Čoček** has not just stayed within the gypsy communities, but also gained great popularity among Serbs, Macedonians, Albanians and Bulgarians, who enjoy performing it at weddings and village gatherings.

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Note: In the syncopated form there is a small lift on the ball of the ft before the two steps in meas 2 and the first step in meas 3.
