Note:

The steps to the Cretiko Syrto have been applied to the music of the song, "Misirlou." This dance was performed to the strains of this music, "just for the fun of it," and it seems to have been picked up by folk-dance enthusiasts throughout the country.

Actually though, it does resemble an odalik dance; i.e., a harem dance, though hands or small fingers were not held, and

there is a slight difference in the steps.

## STA DIO

(Pogonissios)

Characteristics: In northern Epirus, the dancers are more animated than those in the southern part where only the first two dancers leap, jump and hop while the rest of the line performs the basic step in a more or less solemn attitude. Formation: Open circle, moving counter-clockwise with regular W handhold.

Time: 2/4

Steps: (Slow, Quick, Quick)

- 1 & Side r.
- 2 Cross l. behind r.
- & Side r.
- 1 & Cross l. in front of r.
- 2 Side r.
- & Cross l. in front of r.
