<u>NIŠKA BANJA</u>

Serbia/Macedonia (Yugoslavia)

Niška banja (NEESH'-kah`BAHN'-yah, "the Turkish baths in Niš [city in Serbia]") has for years been a favorite song among Serbians and Macedonians. Its verses are improvised, the singers constantly inventing new ones about the supposed goings-on at the Turkish baths in Niš. In 9/8 meter, the rhythm is associated with Gypsy music, especially the dance <u>Čoček</u> (CHOH'-check). The dance described here is a line or circle dance which has become popular among recent immigrants from Yugoslavia in the U.S., and is known simply as <u>Niška banja</u>. Its European origins, if any, are unknown.

Meter: 9/8, in a quick-quick-quick-slow pattern:

Count: q q q S Note value: 1 2 3 4

Formation: Mixed men and women in large open circle or line, hands joined at sides.

Pattern

Part 1 (verse) - Traveling to right

- Facing center, step Rft sideward R (1); step Lft behind Rft (2); turning to face slightly R, step Rft in LOD (3); continuing in LOD, step Lft across Rft (4).
- Continuing in LOD, step R-L-R-L (1,2,3,4).
- 3-8 Repeat mov'ts of meas 1-2 three more times for total of four.

Part 2 (chorus) - Forward & back with claps

- Facing center and releasing hands, step Rft forward (toward center), clapping hands in front (1); step Lft forward, clapping hands (2); step Rft forward, clapping hands (3); bounce on Rft, letting Lft kick slightly forward, clapping hands for the 4th time (4).
- Reverse footwork and direction of meas 1, i.e., 3 steps and a bounce backward (away from center) beginning with Lft, clapping 4 times.
- 11-16 Repeat movits of meas 9-10 three more times for total of four.
